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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya is a rural college established in 1996 and is associated with the name of Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta, the younger brother of the Vedantic Scientist Swami Vivekananda and a pioneering personality of the glorious Bengal Renaissance. Dr. Dutta's involvement with Hatgobindapur and its surrounding areas went back to pre-independence days when he was involved to bring about the much awaited socio-economic development of this rural area. To commemorate his work and contribution, a decision had been taken in a mass meeting in 1983 to establish a general degree college in the name of Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta and thereafter Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya was established in 1996, as a State Govt. Aided College affiliated to The University of Burdwan.

Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya is situated at Hatgobindapur proper in an ambient pollution free environment, which is 14 kilometers away from Burdwan township, linked by Burdwan-Kalna road. It has good road connectivity and Saktigarh, the nearest Railway Station is only 6 kms. away from the college. All sorts of agricultural marketing and shopping facilities are available at the place and Hatgobindapur is famous for its 'Hat' on Thursday and Monday of every week. Frequent local bus services, long route bus services linking Sub Divisional Head Quarters are also available with an important stoppage at this point.

The College was established in 1996 to ease the avenues of success for overall development ranging from social, cultural, economic to aesthetic arena with due thrust on rural people especially S.C., S.T. and OBC community and principally the women folk of these backward classes. It is to embark on a transformative journey of knowledge, innovation and success for the learner to cope up with the future needs and challenges in life with a view to attain sustainability to keep the flow to expansion and augmentation. The institution is keenly interested to provide all kind of facilities to the learner ranging from conveyance to arrange all along opportunities gained through facility arrangement by cooperation dialogue with the concerned authorities. Learner friendly ambient environment maintenance is our all time pre requisite to retain our age long heritage. The institution aspires to achieve the levels of ----

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya is an affiliated college under The University of Burdwan. The college strictly adheres to the curriculum as laid down by the University. The college offers fifteen honours courses and fifteen general courses. The college follows Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) which is framed by the affiliating university. The college ensures effective delivery of course curricula for the benefit of the students. In order to effective implementation of the curriculum, academic calendar is prepared for each session under the guidance of IQAC, taking into consideration of academic calendar of the parent university. The internal assessment strictly follows the university norms that include attendance, internal marks, assignments and seminars by the students. The departments ensure effective delivery of the syllabus with pre planned modules. The college offers courses that integrate cross cutting issues as a part of curriculum prescribed by The University of Burdwan. Apart from imparting theoretical knowledge on these issues through curriculum delivery, the college endeavours to make the students aware and responsible towards the issues related to professional ethics, gender, human values and environment and sustainability by conducting various events and programmes. The institution in the last five years has introduced several add-on courses like Introduction to GIS, Advanced excel and Gender sensitisation: building inclusive communities etc. and also value-added courses like Yoga education, health and wellness. Feedback from various stakeholders like students, alumni, employers and faculty members on the issues of syllabus, teaching learning, infrastructural facility, the academic performance and ambience of the institution are taken through a structured questionnaire. Feedbacks are analysed and communicated by the IQAC to the appropriate authority for further action and the same is available on the college website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The teaching learning and evaluation of Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya adheres to the regulations as laid down by The University of Burdwan and Dept. of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal. The total intake capacity of the college is 2107 (2109 in 2022-2023 with a special permission from the University) and the average enrolment is 40.08% in the assessment period of 2018-2019 to 2022-2023. Our college is situated in a rural area with a good number of SC, ST and OBC students. In the assessment period 46.31% seats of the reserved category have been filled up. The number of teaching staff has been increased from 38 to 81 with a student teacher ratio of 24.67% in the assessment period. 93.14% of sanctioned teaching post have been filled up. 73.62% of our teachers are qualified with NET/SET/Ph. D.

As per Rules and Regulations of The University of Burdwan our college has outlined its internal assessment and evaluation process. The internal assessment is based on class test or assignment or seminar. Semester end examination is conducted by the University. Any student can submit examination related grievance to the Centre-In- Charge or Grievance-redressal cell. Examination cell solves such grievances with utmost priority. Non-transparent or unfair evaluation practices if any are directly reported by the students to the Grievance-redressal cell. As of now we have not received any such grievance from the students.

Accomplishment and evaluation of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) by the students have been one of the primary objectives of our teaching-learning process. We follow both direct and indirect method of PO-CO attainment and evaluation. Result analysis, Feedback survey, Student placement and Progression to higher education are the main parameters of the PO-CO attainment and evaluation. The average pass percentage during the periods stood at 83.03%. The lowest pass percentage was in the year 2018-19 (44.32%) whereas the highest pass percentage was in the year 2019-20 (99.62%). However, we have to consider the unusual situation of COVID-19 outbreak during the assessment period that limits the comparability of the results between years.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college encourages teachers and students in research, innovation and extension activities which is reflected in their activities. The institution has received grants in the departments of Chemistry, History, Economics and Commerce. The total amount of grant is 4.55 lakh. The college has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian knowledge system etc. The cultural heritage cell has conducted different activities. Under Indian knowledge system, the departments of Sanskrit, Physical Education, Philosophy, Mass Communication & Journalism, Geography, History, Commerce have organized different courses on Sanskrit language & communications, research methodology, methods in Indian philosophy, field trip, educational tour and academic excursion respectively. For research works and pursuing doctoral degree 'no objections certificates' have been issued to faculty members. The college has conducted 24 such workshops/seminars/conferences including intellectual property right. The teachers of the college have actively engaged in publishing research papers and total 82 research articles have been published in UGC CARE listed journals as well as in some peer reviewed reputed journals. Teachers have also 44 number of publications in books and book-chapters in edited volumes and in national conference proceedings. The college has arranged different extension activities for students and faculties in the neighbourhood community for sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development. The students and teachers of the department of Mass communication & Journalism has conducted a community outreach programme. Students of the college have actively participated in general awareness programmes on the prevention of vector-borne diseases, AIDs, Covid-19, tree plantation etc. The college has received a grant of INR 25,000/- and INR 3,00,000/- in recognition to the national champion of football by Reliance foundation youth sports (RFYS) in 2020. The college has received recognitions from State

blood transfusion council, West Bengal, Block medical officer of health, Borshul BPHC, West Bengal, Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural education, Govt. of India, Physical education foundation of India, Govt. of India, and the University of Burdwan. The college has conducted various extension and outreach programmes through organized forums including NSS with involvement of community. The college has 22 MoUs/linkages with institutions in India for faculty exchange programmes.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has its own campus area of 35050.16 sq. m out of which 4457.24 Sq.m is built up area. It includes academic and administrative buildings, two hostels, sports complex, Multi-Gym, Nabanna Mancha for cultural programme, college canteen and there are two ponds, one inside the main campus and the other outside the main campus. The college runs with eighteen departments. Presently the college has twenty-eight (28) classrooms including one smart classroom. Thirteen well equipped laboratories, four ICT enabled classrooms; and one well equipped seminar hall are frequently used. There are three computer laboratories out of them two in the departments of Mathematics and Commerce and one is general computer laboratory. Separate rooms are assigned for IQAC, NSS, NSOU. Adequate drinking water facility, toilet facility and sanitary pad vending machine are available in the campus. Physical Education department and the "Games and Sports Sub-Committee" organizes sports activities. College has two playgrounds for football, volleyball, and basketball. College has also a well-equipped Gymnasium. Annual athletic meet is organized every year by the college. College tries to maintain an eco-friendly environment by installing solar panel and using green generator as a power back-up system. The institution organizes different cultural programmes on special occasions. The college has collaborations with other academic and corporate institutes in the form MoU. College Library has a rich collection of over 19119 books including both the text and the reference books. Koha ILMS is used for the purpose of automation of the library. The Barcode is used to represent the accession numbers and the patron card number. Besides subscribing few printed journals, the college is a member of N-LIST project. The library provides various services like circulation, OPAC, reference service and periodicals service. The college uses of office management software, library management software for management and governance purposes in the areas of online processing of student admission, fees payment, search the OPAC and access to e-resources.

Student Support and Progression

Student being the primary stakeholder of the institution, curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular support to them has been the utmost priority of the institution. As an outcome of these efforts their progression to higher education and the employment market has been steadily increasing over the assessment period thanks to the capacity development and skill enhancements programs of our college. Our college is set-up in a rural background with a large number of first generation learners who are economically backward but highly enthusiastic to learn and grow in life. To support their ambition of learning and growth we extensively support them in availing different scholarship schemes at college level as well as at the level of state government, central government and non-profit organisations. Different scholarship schemes cater to 70.63% students out of the total enrolled students in the assessment period. All the statutory and regulatory committees like Anti Ragging committee, Grievance Redressal Committee and Internal Complaints Committee are formed following appropriate regulations, rules and Acts and all these committees are adequately functional and active. Students' achievement in sports is exceptionally rich and a unique differentiator of our college. In the assessment period our students have secured 45 awards in different sports like football, volleyball, kho kho, and athletics at district, state and national level during the assessment period. In this regard we also note here their overwhelming participation in different sports as well as cultural activities which adds to the vibrancy of the

campus life. The College has a registered Alumni Association under West Bengal Societies Registration Act, 1961. The registration is done on 20.06.2024 which is out of the scope of our assessment period of 2018-19 to 2022-23.

Governance, Leadership and Management

This criterion entitled 'Governance, Leadership and Management' is composed of mainly five component units: 1. Institutional Vision and Leadership, 2. Strategy Development and Deployment, 3. Faculty Empowerment Strategy, 4. Financial Management and Resource mobilization, 5. Internal Quality Assurance System. Keeping in vision the socio-cultural, economic and aesthetic development of the locality, the college goes ahead with a mission of upholding the great societal as well as moral values among the students by sharing facilities to gear up to strengthen their solid footing in future either in the entry to higher education or to boost up them in search of proper livelihood. This is perfectly reflected in institutional practices of decentralization and participation of all the stakeholders in administration that runs democratically abiding by rules and regulations of UGC, affiliating university (The University of Burdwan) and Higher Education Department of West Bengal Government. Strategies have been developed in accordance with the long and short term plans that have been reflected through the resolutions taken by Governing Body, IQAC, RUSA, Teachers' Council and the various Committees and Sub-Committees. The college implements e-governance in all aspects, especially after the COVID pandemic, in administration, admission, finance and accounts, library automation and examination. Accounts are maintained through office management software. Every expenditure is done according to budget and through proper channel such as Purchase Committee, Finance Committee and Governing Body concurrence. The college has self-appraisal system on daily basis and PBAS maintained by IQAC on the basis of which incumbent is promoted to the next higher position. The college provides various welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff and students such as health services, Group insurance, Co-Operative and Credit Society as well as infrastructural facilities like purified drinking water, cold water, green generators etc. Facilities are provided to the physically challenged staff and students. The college has strategies for mobilization of funds. Funds received from RUSA 1.0, M.P.LAD and other organizations are properly utilized. The college goes for internal and external audit every year. IQAC plays a vital role in policy making and implementing infrastructural and academic and administrative development strategies.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The Institutional Values and Best Practices pivot around the mission and vision of the college. With the motto of upliftment of the women, Gender audit and five co-curricular activities have been organized. Besides, the students get support of ICC and Women's Development Cell. The institution is also committed to the cause of sustainable environment that gets evident with the installation of Solar panels, use energy efficient electrical appliances, proper management of waste, rain water harvesting, maintenance of college pond, regular plantation programs, use of lawn mower, declaration of plastic free zone, use of sustainable vehicles, landscaping with medicinal trees and upholding biodiversity. The college has also organized five programs promoting green beyond the campus. The facility of wheel chair and ramps assure barrier free environment. Green audit and energy audit has been done to provide credibility to the activities undertaken. Institutional efforts/initiatives in providing an inclusive environment include 9 programs like Hool Divas, International Yoga Day, International Mother's Language Day or Bhasha Diwas, 25 she Baisakh, 22 she Shrabon, Vidyasagar Jayanti, Agomoni, Annual Social, Vani Vandana and Vasanta that are organized every year and 10 programmes like Independence Day, Partition Horrors Remembrance Day, Republic Day, Birth Anniversary of Netaji, Youth Day, Constitution Day, Teachers' Day, Condolence meeting to pay respect

to the martyrs of Pulwama Attack on 14/2/2019 and Celebration of Silver Jubilee year and publication of code of conduct are dedicated for the Sensitization of students and employees to the constitutional obligations. The institutional best practices *Jemon Khela Temni Je Kaaj*: *Community Engagement through Sports and* **Naari hok Kandari**: **Fostering Women Leadership embody the core values of the college which is committed to the cause of weak and marginalized.** The Institutional Distinctiveness lies in its excellence in sports. Beginning from a humble background with bare minimal infrastructure and funding the dedicated and talented students, primarily from the SC, ST community, have gained accolade in diverse sports activities over last nine years. Their journey may be hailed as one from limitations to limelight.

As the objective of multidisciplinary education being 'to Connect', it is an integral part of our education system. It is worth-mentioning that multidisciplinary education is important in holistic education. The role of learning any subject is fourfold: (1) Professional, which means preparing student for a career in a given field, (2) Utility and Relevance, which connects the subject to the development of societies, (3) Democracy and Citizenship, which relates to the subject literacy of the learner for informed participating in discussing and solving social problems and challenges, and (4) Cultural and Intellectual, which refers to improvement in learner's skills in critical thinking and intellectual nurturing. All these four dimensions are inter-related and an integral part of total education. It is beyond careeroriented learning, and transcends to overall development of human kind, be it social, cultural and universal. Multidisciplinary education is thus a necessity for integral development as well as personal improvement. It is extremely necessary to provide a greater exposer to a learner by giving him/her an opportunity to involve in multidisciplinary education.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The National Education Policy has launched the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC)to enhance a multidisciplinary, flexible approach to study. ABC is a virtual or digital storehouse that is a centralised repository housing the comprehensive credit records of individual statements as they progress through their educational journey. Making a provision by offering flexibility through Multiple Entry and Multiple Exit with a tune of affectionate essence. We have to find out issues related to societal need and for which special efforts will be given to mitigate related challenges. We abide by the rules and regulations and also follow instructions of the University of Burdwan as per their stipulated programmes through a nodal officer engaged from our end. We have no individuality in this regard.

3. Skill development:

Skills are basically the intelligence of individual or the group by which things are done or developed with the available resources, materials or things utilizing of which the objectives are done. College has organised various Skill Development programmes like-'Soft Skill Development'; Development of
Language and Communication Skills like- 'Sanskrit
Language and Communication skills on Translation
Studies' and 'Seminar on communicative skills
Enhancement in Bengali'; Life skills like- 'Physical
Therapy and Yoga'; Technological Skill
Development like- 'Management of Google
Workspace as a Learning Educational Tool' and
'Introduction to Geo-Informatics'...

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The Indian Knowledge System (IKS) encompasses a rich heritage of traditional wisdom, culture, languages, and educational practices. By integrating IKS into the curriculum, our college can provide a transformative educational experience for undergraduate students. This integration not only preserves and promotes indigenous knowledge but also enhances students' mobility to cultural roots, making education more relevant and meaningful. We explore strategies for effectively integrating IKS into our college's undergraduate programs. Celebrating Festivals and Cultural Events: Organizing festivals and cultural events on campus can bring the vibrancy of Indian traditions to life. Eighteen courses of study are offered by out college, among which Sanskrit, Philosophy transmit the values of the Vedas, Upanishads, Bhagavad Gita, and other philosophical literatures which serve as the foundation for the Indian knowledge system (IKS). Indian classical music or Raga Sangeet, an inegral part of our knowledge system is also included in the curriculam of music honours course which inculcates the inner self of the students. To keep pace with the principles of IKS, our college has adopted a holistic approach incorporating various aspects of human life, covering physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual components. Then college has already introduced several certificate/add-on / Value added courses on Yoga and Meditation for physical, mental, emotional well-being.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The college has increased focus on outcome-based approach to education. It gives importance on monitoring continuous quality improvement. Care is taken to ensure fulfilling the requirement of the curriculum offered by the University of Burdwan. To enhance comprehensive and procedural knowledge required for carrying out professional or skilled students, the college arranges necessary Add on or

Certificate Courses to inculcate the following skills among them: problem solving skills, critical thinking ability, spirit of teamwork, collaboration, judgement and decision making, communication skill etc. Students may acquire leadership skills, citizenship skills and values, self-management, reflective thinking, ethical and moral reasoning, knowledge and practice of human and constitutional values, fundamental duties, gender sensitivity, knowledge of India etc. Teachers of the college adopt multiple approaches to teaching and learning such as problembased teaching, individual project-based learning, practical work, field based learning, visit to industries etc. We also adopt multiple approaches to learning assessment which covers all domains of learning such as time-constrained examination, problem-based assignments, practical assignment report, observation of practical skill, individual project report, oral presentation, seminar presentation, viva -voce etc. The motto of such kinds of education is to prepare skilled students to be competent enough in the next phase of higher study or employment. A good number of placements is self-explanatory to this kind of venture.

6. Distance education/online education:

Dr. Bhupendra Nath Duta Smriti Mahavidyalaya, as a centre of learning in higher education, has catered to the educational needs of its students since its establishment, and to keep up the commitment of providing quality higher education in various periods. While face-to-face teaching learning process, often hailed as offline classes has proved to be the most effective medium of instruction, use of virtual mode has become very much instrumental and effective since the pandemic phase. Our college is also making significant contribution in the fields of distance education through its Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU) Centre. Various subjects for PG (Bengali, English, History, Commerce, Education, MSW, MLIS, BLIS, PG Diploma in Mass Communication and Journalism) courses are offered and taught. Our college provides platforms for online materials to the students. Our college is also a member of NLIST project through which the e-journals and the e-books of N-LIST can be accessed online. During the covid-19 pandemic online classes are arranged to impart education using Google workspace, Zoom, Skype etc. Different WhatsApp groups are formed by

teachers to communicate and deliver learning materials to students.

Effective Curriculum Planning:

Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya is affiliated to The University of Burdwan and adheres to its curriculum. The teachers who are members of University Board of Studies are actively engaged in curriculum framing and modifications time to time.

- The college has a system to ensure effective curriculum planning. The IQAC of the college prepares an academic calendar in consultation with the institutional authority at the beginning of the year adhering to that notified by The University of Burdwan with details of commencement of sessions, internal examinations, Government holidays along with dates of important events. Academic calendar is uploaded in the college website.
- The routine sub-committee calls a meeting at the beginning of the year. A centralized routine is prepared before the commencement of each semester. Routine is prepared in accordance to the number of credit points mentioned in the prescribed university syllabus of each course offered by the departments. In respect to that a departmental routine is also walled up on the departmental notice board.
- The syllabus is distributed among the teachers in departmental meetings and classes are allotted as per the routine. The teaching module and lesson plans are prepared by the teachers of the respective departments.
- Students are informed about the lesson plan, course curriculum, course outcome and mode of curriculum delivery through orientation programmes.
- Student progression is monitored through class test and Continuous Internal Evaluation System. This allows the students to address their strength and weakness before university exams.

Effective Delivery of Curriculum:

• Teaching modes include chalk and talk, student seminar, interactive learning, field and laboratory-based learning. Apart from conventional chalk and talk method, ICT based teaching learning methods are used. During the Covid period online classes and assessment both internal and external were conducted through online platforms like Skype, Zoom, Google meet, Google classroom, YouTube link and WhatsApp group. Study materials were shared via Google classroom and WhatsApp group.

Environment and Sustainability

Environmental Studies is also included in Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course1 (AECC1) in Semester 1 of the CBCS curriculum. The curriculum of Environment Studies Project engages students in practical knowledge on environmental matters. Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Mechanism of internal/external assessment

As per Rules and Regulations of The University of Burdwan, Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya outlined its internal assessment evaluation process.

- As per University regulation No. U. Reg. (CBCS)7: The evaluation of a student is based on continuous assessment. Every semester, there are two internal exams for each subject. Each semester assessment is divided into four discrete component C1, C2, C3 & C4. Internal assessment of each course consists of C1, C2 and C3 taken together.
- The students are informed about the modalities of continuous assessment activities well in advance. The internal assessment is based on class test or assignment or seminar. During the first

two months of each semester, college completes one third of the syllabus. The continuous assessment of C1 is consolidated during eighth week of the semester concerned.

- The second component- C2 of assessment is for five months of each course having full marks 75 or 50 (except AECC-2) as the case may be. This is based on class test or assignment or seminar. During the second two months of the semester, 2/3rd of the syllabus is completed and the continuous assessment of C2 is done during 16th week of the semester. Appearance in C1 & C2 is mandatory.
- C3 comprise of 5 marks for attendance only for CC, DSE and GE. All records relating to C1, C2
 & C3 are preserved by the College at least for a period of one year after the completion of relevant semester examination.

Internal examination related notifications are circulated by the concerned Department in college website & Departmental Notice Board. Examinations are totally conducted by concerned Departments. Students are informed in advance of the dates, times, format, and style of questions. This examination schedules are posted in detail on the college website at least seven days prior to the examinations, and the review procedure takes ten days to finish. Students who miss class for legitimate or medical reasons will be given a new exam. date after submitting their applications on time.

Practical Examinations are conducted by the respective Departments following University norms.

Internal Assessment and Practical marks are uploaded in the Web Portal of The University of Burdwan.

During the 21st – 23rd weeks of a semester, Semester- end Examinations are held for each course and the proportion of C4 is of 80% of the total marks of each course. To qualify in a Practical-based course, an examinee is to appear in the Theoretical as well as the Practical examination portions in the same semester.

Final semester examination conducted by the University.

Grievance redressal

Any Student can submit examination related grievance to the Centre-In- Charge. Centre-In- Charge forwarded it to Examination Cell. Examination cell solved such grievances within 3 days.

Response:

Accomplishment and evaluation of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) by the students are one of the primary objectives of our teaching-learning process at Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya. The Program Outcome outlines the macro-level expected outcomes from a specific program which is built on the Course Outcomes embedded into the program. First we outline the Program Outcome and map them with Course Outcomes.

PO-CO Attainment and Evaluation:

We follow both direct and indirect method of PO-CO attainment and evaluation. Under direct method we analysed the results in detail to assess the PO-CO attainment. Student examination results have two major components. One is the evaluation through University Semester Examination with 80% weightage of marks. The other portion is the internal assessment by respective course teachers that counts for 20% weightage of marks. In the indirect method, Program and Course Outcome attainment is evaluated through a survey. Further we analyse the data of student progression to higher education and placement as the measure of PO-CO attainment. Here we present the analysis of PO-CO attainment.

A. Result Analysis

The institution employs student result analysis as a key metric for gauging student performance. Course Outcomes are appraised by analysing the results by the department at the conclusion of each semester, while Programme Outcomes are determined by evaluating the overall program results after a student's completion of all six semesters. The pass percentage of our college has been fluctuating during the assessment period (2018-2023). The lowest pass percentage was in the year 2018-19 (44.32%) whereas the highest pass percentage was in the year 2019-20 (99.62%). Here we have to consider the unusual situation of COVID outbreak during the assessment period that limits the comparability of the results between years. From category-wise analysis we found that students from SC, ST and OBC category secured pass percentage of 35.48%, 31.81% and 34.83% respectively in the year 2018-19 which has increased to 63.91%, 54.34% and 69.47% respectively at the end of the assessment period of 2022-23.

B. Feedback survey:

We have used randomisation in feedback survey which is attached as an additional document. The feedback from the students is encouraging. 68.1% students have expressed very high satisfaction for overall learning experience. There are avenues where we can improve those in future.

C. Placement:

The progression of students to higher education and placement serves as a determining factor for assessing the learning outcomes, as well as the skills, abilities, and knowledge they have acquired. Career counselling Cell, active student mentoring, life-skills training, job-oriented Add-on courses play as pivotal forces for students' success in the job-market. In spite of being a rural college we have secured 8 placements in the year 2018-19 which has increased to 36 in the year 2022-23.

D. Progression to Higher Education:

Response:

Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya has excellent physical and academic infrastructure, with an eco-friendly green environment, making it so beautiful institution. The college consistently updates its academic facilities in accordance with the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university, addressing the evolving needs of both students and teachers. The campus area is about 35050.16 sq.m. and built up area of 4,457.24 sq.m. along with green space of about 22,377 sq. m. in and around it. It encompasses academic and administrative buildings, two hostels (one for boys and one for girls), a sports complex having football, basketball and volleyball ground, a Multi Gym, Nabanna Stage for cultural performance and a pond. The college houses a total of 18 departments, offering a range of courses. Many departments maintain their own libraries, in addition to the central. Currently, the college has 27 classroom, 1 smart classroom. The institution has 1 Auditorium, 1 Seminar Room and 1 Computer Laboratory. There are total 13 laboratories for the departments of Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Nutrition, Geography, and Physical Education and 3 computer laboratories out of them 2 in the departments of Mathematics and Commerce and 1 is General computer laboratory. Presently, there are total 74 computers available for academic purposes. Total 4 rooms (seminar hall, smart class room and other two rooms) have fixed ICT facility with ceiling mount overhead LCD projectors. College library housed in the Rashbehari Bose building has a collection of 19119 books. And it subscribes online journals through N-List in addition to one Bengali and one English daily news paper and some popular magazines. Koha ILMS is used to automate the process of library works. All classrooms are wellequipped with proper lighting, fans, green/white boards, benches, and ventilation. The institution features common spaces such as a staffroom, common rooms for boys and girls, and a students' union room. Dedicated rooms are assigned for IQAC, NCC, NSS, and NSOU. Free Wi-Fi connection is available for all the stakeholders. Purified and cool drinking water is available in strategic locations. 10 CCTV cameras installed in strategically placed for surveillance. Separate toilet facilities are provided for boys and girls students and also for male and female staff. A sanitary pad vending machine is available in the girls' common room. The college canteen caters to the needs of students and staff. There is ample parking spaces with shed. Solar panel of 10 kWp has been installed in the college and the electricity generated are distributed through power grid. College has procured four(4) Green Generators for uninterrupted power supply and pollution free environment. The college organises its Annually Social Programme involving all departments by displaying departmental stalls. An Annual Sports Meet is successfully organized each year. Cultural programmes on the days of Teachers' Day, Bhasha divas, Rabindra Jayanti, Saraswati Puja and Freshers' Welcome ceremony initiated by students. College also observes Independence Day, Republic Day, Netaji's Birthday, Environment Day etc. Additionally, the

Library building is named in the name freedom fighter Rashbehari Bose. The library of this college is a partially open access library with collection of approximately 19119 books. Books are classified by using DDC 23rd edition classification schedule and catalogued using MARC21 format and following the rules framed in Anglo American Cataloguing Code (R) 1988. Subject heading is derived from Sears' list of Subject Headings for books written roman script and using a Bengali Classification Schedule for books written in Bengali script.

Reading Rooms: There are two separate reading rooms

- Reading room for students
- Separate Teachers reading room.

• Monday to Friday: 10.30 AM to 4.30 PM

• Saturday:10.30 AM to 3.30 PM

Users of the library: Students, teachers and non teaching staff members are the users of the library.

Response:

Best Practice – 1:

Jemon Khela Temni Je Kaaj: Community Engagement through Sports

The Context:

The locality of Hatgobindapur comprises people of backward classes who have little exposure to quality training in sports. The playground of Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya has a mesmerizing effect on all. It attracts children from local as well as distant areas to play especially in the afternoon. Sports is one of the key areas of excellence in this college and the Department of Physical Education has been adding feathers to the hat relentlessly. Keeping in mind the motto of Gurudev Rabindranath Thakur, "Shikshar modhye Krirarsthan boro" (Sports has great significance in education), the institution has extended its sportsman expertise to the local students to nurture their talents. The best practice encourages the mission and vision of the college inculcating the motto espoused by Gurudev in his song "Moder jemon Khela temni Je kaaj Janis naki ki bhai" (As we play so we work, don't you know dear).

Objective:

- 1. Identifying and Nurturing of the talent of playing football primarily for the College Football Team
- 2. searching of the talent of playing other games among school children so that they may have the option of taking sports as a career
- 3.to build confidence among the school students from marginalised sections to pursue sports in higher education
- 4. building affectionate bond with the local people
- 5. promotion of health and fitness of the local school children.

The Practice:

The training of local school children is offered by the teachers of the Department of Physical Education.

The training is given after the college hours. The school students love to play on the ground after their regular classes at their respective schools. Students from standard eight onwards are given the required training. The practice has been offered in an informal manner for many years. But the practice has been formalized since session 2022-2023 onwards when Memoranda of Understanding has been signed with different schools who have agreed to send eager and talented players for training. Students are trained to play different games like Football, Kho-Kho, Kabadi and Yoga.

Evidence of Success:

The evidence of success is evident in the fact that nearly thirty students, among those who have taken training have chosen sports as their future career. Thay have enrolled themselves in this institution after passing out of their schools. Moreover, they have also excelled in their respective sports activity so that they have now moved on to take sports as their career. And some have got placement on the virtue of their sports skill.

Problems Encountered:

The primary problem encountered is lack of awareness amongst the parents specially from backward caste and class regarding the scope as well as the necessity of sports in higher education. However, over the years confidence has developed in them. Second major problem is the lack of requisite number of teachers in the department who act as trainers of these young minds.

Best Practice 2:

Naari hok Kandari: Fostering Women Leadership

Context:

Indian law-makers have time and again felt the need for women empowerment. Multiple projects have been launched to combat the social evils of female foeticide (*Beti bachao*, *Beti padao*), early drop-outs and child marriage (*Kanyashree* and *Rupashree*). It is noteworthy that the mission and vision of the governments have yielded fruit so that evils of the society have decreased over the years. However, the women in workforce still face gender bias. Often women face a glass ceiling that prevents them from advancing to the position of team leaders or policy makers at workplaces. Coined by feminist Marilyn Lodenaa, "glass ceiling" is primarily an invisible obstacle that marginalised genders face at workplace. In this context it can be asserted that this institution does not have any Glass Ceilings and adopts fair representation of women at all levels. Women employees have acted as the captain (*Kandari*), to remember the words of revolutionary poet Kazi Nazrul Islam, helping the college to sail through in its formative years.

Objectives:

- 1. To identify and promote strong leadership and growth of women as individuals in their own right.
- 2. To develop the self-confidence in women in achieving advancement of careers.
- 3. To promoting the principle of anti-discrimination and gender equality and discourage negative attitudes, behaviours, and beliefs of gender discrimination.
- 4. Increase the mass awareness and education on women's roles and capabilities.

Practice:

The college has always been fair in its attitude to women staff. The employees have received fair opportunity in all academic and administrative bodies in this co-ed college. The academic as well as the administrative ambience of the college has garnered and supported women leaders. Under women leadership different programs have been organised for the upliftment of the girl students in the college. Workshops on art and craft in collaboration with Pidilite company, Cake-making (in Collaboration with District Kanyashree Prokolpo, Government of West Bengal), and self-defence programs have been organised.

Problems Encountered:

Breaking the glass ceiling is itself addressing a traditional discrimination perpetrated against women on the basis of gender. The challenge is more from the society as working women have to balance their work load both at home and at the workplace. Women have to get rid of the sense of guilt that the society endorses upon them for focusing more on their career than on their family. The institution must continue to be inclusive and accentuate progress.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Dr. Bhupendra Nath Dutta Smriti Mahavidyalaya has been named after the youngest brother of the illustrious son of India, Narendranath Dutta, known to all as Swami Vivekananda. Bhupendranath Dutta is a noted educationist who worked hard to spread education among the rural masses at Hatgobindapur and its surrounding areas in the colonial era. His lantern lectures instilled the zeal of education among the local people. The local people also played a significant role in Indian Independence Movement and subsequent social reforms that pervaded Bengal history. Many distinguished educationists, doctors, engineers, social workers and other dignitaries have their roots in the rural areas of Hatgobindapur. However, earlier this zeal for higher education has been confined to the affluent classes who could afford to move on to the local township of then Burdwan for higher studies. Hatgobindapur is one of the most prosperous blocks of the Purba Bardhaman district (West Bengal) in terms of agriculture. But ironically the majority of the population comprise the poor and backward classes whose education has been limited to higher secondary level because of their socio-economic constraints. Girls have had been the major sufferers as they were pushed to another society in absence of scope of higher education in the locality.

To pursue the ideals of Bhupendranath Dutta and fulfil his dreams the local patrons of education founded this institution with the mission and vision of spreading education to the local people especially the backward ones and named it after him as a tribute. The college stands unique for its beautiful green campus flattered with lush green ambience sprawling over an area of 8.65 acres of land. In the span of 27 years, the institution has succeeded in attracting students from even the local town and adjacent community blocks moving beyond its domain of eleven feeder schools. It has brought a significant section of the rural, poor and backward classes including the aboriginals within the domain of higher education. The college has guided many young minds to achieve success in diverse fields giving them strong wings to cross the boundary that put limitation upon them.

Soaring up to the Lights: The Distinctiveness

The success of the students always becomes an inspiration for all for both the mentors and the mentee. Special acclaim may be given to the achievement of students in Sports. Sports activity is carried out under the aegis of the Department of Physical Education (PEGD). However, students from other disciplines have also participated and excelled in sports. The college has soared up high in the sky with the proud and continuous achievements of the students in diverse sports events like Football, Kho-Kho (Men and Women), Yoga, Handball, Basketball, Volleyball, Hapkido, Taekwondo and Athletics with Football remaining as the crown of all sports activity. The college boys were the National Champions (Reliance Foundation Youth Sports, RFYS) in the session 2019-2020. The team first topped the state as City Champions in West Bengal. Then it qualified for the national Championship by emerging as the East Zone champions and finally etched history to become National Champions.

The percentage of players belonging to the reserved category is 53%, 67%, 56% and 66% in the sessions 2018-19, 2019-2020, 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 respectively. And the representation of woman players is also significant. Besides the above sports the students have participated in other sports activity like Handball,

Volleyball and Chess. It is a matter of great honour that four of our students, Subhendu Mandi, Rabi Das, Rabi Hasda and Surojit Hasda have moved forward to play in the prestigious Santosh Trophy Football (Senior National) in 2022. Rabi Das and Surojit Hasda have got gold medals at prestigious National Games. Truly have the students overcome the limitations of their background to lead the college to the limelight and create the institutional distinctiveness.
